Potted histories...another king given a second chance.

If Henry VI was generally a sorry sight, feeble and weak minded, cousin Edward IV was by contrast charismatic, ruthless, and politically astute. His two reigns (1461-1470 and 1471-1483) were marked by military brilliance and modern management. At over 6'3" and very handsome he had a commanding presence, but his true strength came from his ability to inspire loyalty and form alliances. He had the charm and magnetism of a natural leader. No contest.

Edward's father, Richard Duke of York, was instrumental in causing the Wars of the Roses (1455-1487). Tired of the disastrous reign of Henry of Lancaster he sought the throne; being a direct descendant of Edward III himself. However, after initial military success Richard was killed at the battle of Wakefield (1460). Son Edward was only 18. He didn't hesitate to take up the Yorkist cause; he was everything that Henry was not. His military acumen was immediately clear, winning at Mortimor's Cross (1461) and crushing the Lancastrians at Towton to secure the throne at the age of 19.

Towton, near modern-day Leeds, is generally seen to be the bloodiest battle ever to take place on English soil. Fought in a blinding snowstorm, the Yorkist archers achieved a decisive victory; they had the wind behind them to help outdistance the Lancastrian arrows. The number of casualties is disputed but may be as high as 25,000 and with hundreds of the nobility being slaughtered.

In victory, Edward deposed Henry who fled to Scotland. Henry was eventually captured and moved to London's alternative royal residence, the Tower of London. It was at this point Edward lost the plot and fell in love with the beautiful but low-born Elizabeth Woodville. After raising her lowly, but now cock-of-the-walk, family in the pecking order at Court, Edward's support started to leach away; back to Henry's wife, the redoubtable Margaret of Anjou who was able to bring on her second half substitute king-makers, Warwick and Neville (no, not the one in the waistcoat). Edward was now deposed and fled to France. Henry returned to London, to be led by the hand, like a small child back to Westminster, and to kingly bed. Seriously!

Now it was Edward's turn again. Backed by a French army, he returned. Henry's son and successor was killed in battle and Henry was soon back in the Tower where he died of "a broken heart" LOL. Subsequent analysis showed that his skull was stoved in and his once blond hair covered in blood. Henry's second stint at being a miserably incompetent King had lasted all of 6 months.

Edward now focused on taking full control of his kingdom, once and for all, starting with executing his little brother Clarence on a charge of treason. Well, he did fight for the other side. Fair's fair.

Second, Edward prioritised economic competence over warfare, building trade links, exploiting the value of his crown lands and raising revenue through earnings, not taxation. Parliament sidelined as not really necessary. He patronised scholars, reformed the state administration machinery and promoted legal reforms.

His downfall came as a result of over-indulgence. 10 children with Elizabeth and at least 6 more with his many mistresses. He loved luxury, fine clothes and good food. Increasingly corpulent he died suddenly, age just 40. His young sons Edward V and Richard were looked after by kindly Uncle Richard, soon to be RIII.


Redlynch Players Backstage News

Redlynch & Local District History Society

Our start to this year's season of talks was "The man in the picture" by Robert Inns. The title refereed to a particular picture displayed in his house, as they were in virtually every house after the War, as he was growing up. The fondly remembered man was his mother's brother in RAF uniform; Robert described his efforts and what he discovered over the past 70 years and noted he still found new information in the course of preparing this talk.

Particularly useful were his mother's address book which gave all the stations and units he was posted to. Photos were worth scrutinising for information, the smallest photos were most useful as they were often the originals posted home with annotations on the back. An enquiry to the Air Historical Branch of the RAF gave a summary of his uncle's loss including the serial number of the aircraft.

In the years up to the 1990s, books were and still are the most useful for in depth RAF operations, units and aircraft details However the internet does now have increasing amounts of information including "RAF Command". This gives aircraft records which tell you the unit to which a particular aircraft was on charge and when, and squadron operations books which are particularly useful for details such as particular operations and their crews, aircraft serials and notes.

Combining these sources over a lengthy period of time, nuggets of information provided a chronology of his uncle's journey through the lengthy RAF training from Blackpool via Babbacombe, Cambridge, Rutland, Shawbury to Harwell. From there a Wellington ferry flight in late 1941 to Gibraltar, Malta to Egypt for operations with 162 squadron gathering wireless transmissions intelligence before being lost on a bombing raid during the first battle of El Alamein in July 1942.

Minutes of the Hale Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 2nd September 2025 at 7pm in Hale Village Hall (Downstairs)

Councillors Present: Councillors Donnell, Gemmel I (Chair), Gillmon, Kyle, Lavis and Vickery.

25.76 TO RECEIVE ANY APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE: -NFDC Cllr Janet Richards.

25.77 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST - To receive declarations of interest in respect of matters contained in this agenda (in accordance with the Localism Act 2011). None declared.

25.78 MINUTES

25.78.1 It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to approve the minutes of the meeting held on 1st July 2025. **25.78.2** There were no matters arising from the minutes not elsewhere on the agenda.

25.79 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Three parishioners were included in discussions relating t item 25.80 One parishioners was included in the discussion relating to item 25.81

25. 80 HARRY'S MEADOW - The campsite called Harry's Meadow which is set within the grounds of Hale Park operated from 4th July until 31st August in 2025. Local parishioners and the parish council were very concerned that fire pits were allowed in such dry conditions particularly as there were many very large forest fires in the New Forest area. Hale PC objected strongly to the NPA regarding the use of fire pits however the NPA permitted their use through a Discharge of Planning Conditions. Parishioners were also concerned that equipment was still currently present on site therefore exceeding the 60 days allowed for operation. Concerns were also raised that camping was seen under the avenue of lime trees, many of which are in poor health and in such dry conditions susceptible to falling boughs. Parishioners can report any infringements to the NPA Planning Enforcement team.

HPC will invite David Illsley (NPA) to the next meeting in November to discuss parishioner concerns.

25.81 PLANNING APPLICATIONS: To consider the responses to the following applications.

Case Number 25/00818FULL

Proposal One & two storey extensions; front porch; new windows and doors; cladding to the existing garage; a detached single storey timber frame garage and carport to the front garden Site TURBARY EDGE, FOREST ROAD, HALE, FORDINGBRIDGE, SP6 2NP

The applicant attended the meeting and was able to answer many questions relating to the proposals. Councillors discussed the application and agreed that the design was good and recommended permission for the proposals if the NPA conclude that the proposal is within the 30% increase rule.

It was unanimously agreed that Hale PC recommend PERMISSION but would accept the decision reached by the National Park Authority's Officers under their delegated powers.

25.82 EXTERNAL MEETINGS - To receive reports from external meetings attended.

Village Hall Committee Meeting 19th August— Cllr Kyle attended. Work was carried out over the summer to install new lighting and solar panels. A CIL bid has been submitted for the funds to carry out the works for a new accessible toilet.

NW Quadrant meeting July 25th - Cllr Lavis attended.

Matt Wisdom (NFDC) presented the Local Government Reorganisation (slides were circulated to all). John Stride (NPA - Net zero with Nature Programme Manager) presented an Overview of the Special Area of Conservation Plan (slides were circulated to all).

Nigel Stone will represent the NPA at NW Quadrant meetings; Cllr Lavis questioned him regarding Harry's Meadow concerns.

NPA Ranger Hayden Bridgeman presented what his work entails and would like to visit Parish Councils to explain the role of a Park Ranger.

Charlotte Belcher (Forestry England) reported on improvements to car parks and the increase seen in the amount of nesting birds due to habitat restoration..

Neighbourhood Tasking Group 20th May - Cllr Vickery attended. There has been a significant decrease in crime in the Downton and surrounding area largely due to the arrest of 2 individuals. The Community Policing Team now has another full time officer.

25.83 TREES AT HATCHET GREEN Remedial works (to ensure the safety of the trees) planned to be carried out on in August by ADS Treecare will now take place on 17th September. Further works are required on two oak trees in the area to the right of the village hall. It was agreed to approve the cost of £1500 for ADS Treecare to carry out all these works. Permission for the tree works has been received by New Forest Planning Authority.

25.84 CHANGE OF ADDRESS: The address for Hale Parish Council gong forward will be C/O Woodgreen Community Shop, Hale Road, Woodgreen, Fordingbridge SP6 2AJ.

25.85 DEFIBRILLATOR AT VILLAGE HALL: Hale PC has been notified that the defibrillator at the village hall is currently inactive as the battery has failed and the device is now quite old and in need of replacement. A contact in the ambulance service has offered to find a replacement battery and recommend a new device for purchase. The original device was purchased by the Transition Group. Hale Parish Council unanimously agreed to approach these organisations to propose the purchase of defib equally between the three organisations. — Hale PC, Hale Village Hall and Hale and Redlynch Transition Group.

The Race to be Myself - Caster Semenya

Forget what you thought you knew about Semanya – this is about institutional abuse and the strength of a woman, who is different, to survive. In part an autobiography, we learn of her early life, love of the outdoors and football before running became her 'thing'. She always hunted and played with the boys because she was strong. She won Olympic and World Championship gold medals and came close to breaking world records. She trained hard and raced intelligently whenever she was allowed. Ultimately forced to take (legal) drugs by Athletics ruling body to compete she struggled and suffered physically and mentally.

She worked harder and still won races before the Athletics body made it even more difficult for her to compete. That the rule change was personal become obvious when not only was she stopped from running her preferred event the 800m, but the two closest – the 400m and 1500m unless she took increased (legal) drugs. Many similar athletes retired at this point. She did not. She attempted to train for the 200m and 5,000m. She chose to fight for herself and others taking the case to the Courts.

Her description of the abuse she suffered by medically qualified staff in Berlin as an 18 year old the day before she was due to run her first World final isn't fit to recount here. She had already been subjected to gender tests in South Africa and attempts to persuade her to 'retire' by top officials. They did not understand the character of this country girl from Limpopo, a remote area near the Botswana border. Her upbringing, helping her family and then her grandmother in a neighbouring village had ensured she knew what it was to stay strong. Accepted for who she was at home and in her village this book recounts what it took for her to by herself and live the life she wanted.

Reading rooms

The Roman philosopher Cicero said that, "A room without books is like a body without a soul," whilst the English writer, Joseph Addison said, "Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body." Both these quotes capture the spirit of what many Victorians attitude toward reading was.

In the late nineteenth century and early twentieth century, reading rooms were established as places that could be used to encourage the middle and lower classes to improve their literacy skills, to learn and to enable them to play a more useful and engaged role in their community. These reading rooms were often established as a cooperation between the local landowner and clergy. They would have newspapers, reference works, periodicals and books but also might provide spaces for talks or recreational use.

The Rev. Samual Best, Rector of Abbotts Ann, near Andover said, "We want a reading room as a means to an end and that end is the enfranchisement of the intellect of the labouring classes." He saw the reading room as," introducing an intellectual atmosphere into our village... as a counterpoint to the public house and beer shop." The cottages of the working classes were often dark and overcrowded and few could afford to buy reading matter. Reading rooms could provide a sanctuary for them that gave them opportunities for intellectual and personal growth.

There are two remarkable examples of reading rooms locally. Woodgreen Reading and Assembly Room dates from 1897. This small, corrugated iron building was built on land donated by two village families. In later life it was used as a store and in WW2 as a base for the home guard. It was later used as a youth club but was damaged by a vehicle accident in 2017. It was reopened in April 2020 with a new heating system. The parish council meets in the building every month and it is available for any organisation to book. The local cricket group use it as do, very appropriately, the local book club. I am told that recently the council was contacted



by a woman who had reading a book in a reading room on her bucket list. Her wish was granted.



Alderholt reading room was built at the turn of the century through the generosity of Lord and Lady Salisbury who donated the land, financed the building, and provided books and magazines. Books were also provided by Squire Churchill of Alderholt Park. Locals could enjoy games such as Ludo and Cards or use boxing gloves and a punch ball. There was also a billiards table that could be used on payment of 3d. The committee in charge had to include the vicar or the schoolmaster to ensure good behaviour. Heating was provided by a coke stove and lighting by oil lamps. It was open each evening and

for two hours on Sunday and the weekly charge was 2d. This went up to 4d after the first world war. The timber framed and corrugated iron clad building is still available for hire for such things as birthday parties and by small groups such as cubs. It also is open on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesday mornings as a delightful café.

It is remarkable that these buildings are still intact and serving the local community. Long may they continue.

Path along the road to the A338 - Many people from Woodgreen walk along the road to the A338 to get on the X3, this is currently quite a dangerous route. AJ has contacted HCC to find out how this may be instigated. Parking at the village hall - The village hall committee is happy for other village users to park in front of the hall when it is not being used for a hall event, MF has discussed this with Kevin Flack (Chair of the Village Hall), temporary signage is currently in use but more permanent signage will be installed.

Local Government Reorganisation - The District Councils will put their proposals to the Government in September, they have identified savings which can be made which they hope will be in their favour. HCC will put forward a different proposal. The government will carry out a further consultation and make a decision by March 2026.

Waste and Recycling Collections - Collections for Phase 2 households will begin October. This will be the remainder of the village which has not yet begun the new collections. Wheelie bins will be delivered to all properties over the next few weeks. All properties can see what bins they will receive at newforest.gov.uk/findmyphase.

PS and HD visited all the sites and had no issues with the proposed works and therefore recommended to accept the decision of the National Park Authority Tree Officer. This was unanimously agreed.

25/26.70 Meetings Attended:

Woodgreen Village Hall AGM 3rd September - SH, LB and JC attended. The hall is doing well with many regular events and weddings. The hall currently has a CIL bid for £10,000 for solar panel installation. Woodgreen Community Shop AGM 27th August - LB, GR, SH and PS attended. The shop had a better year this year with a profit despite subsidising the Post Office, however part of this was due to a legacy of £5000. Staffing continues to be the highest cost. Sunday hours were increased in the summer which worked well and will continue until the end of September to then be reviewed. Further solar panels will be installed in November which will reduce the electricity costs.

Consultative Panel 4th September - LB attended. There is a possible initiative for New Forest Commoners to be classed as a National Minority which would give them a greater voice on issues. The process would take a minimum of 2 years. Forestry England reported on the results of the PSPOs over the summer season - 4 fines were issued for fire related incidents, there were 169 incidents in total involving 900 people. There has been an increase in dumped and burnt out cars and other fly tipping, possibly due to the very dry, hard ground which allows easier access. FE will go ahead with car park fees for all the car parks in the Forest beginning in April 2026. There are no plans for the National Trust to follow suit.

There will be a Local Plan Review and consultation at the end of the year.

Licensing Panel August 14th - LB attended. The proposed changes to the licence for the Horse and Groom were agreed.







Tales from the River Bank

There is a wonderful scene in 'The Wind in the Willows' when Mole says to the Water Rat, "You must think me very rude; but all this is so new to me -so -this -is a River!" "The River, corrected the Rat." "And you really live by the river? What a jolly life!"

"By it and with it and on it and in it," said the Rat. "It's brother and sister to me, and aunts and company and food and drink and (naturally) washing. It's my world and I don't want any other. What it hasn't got is not worth having and what it doesn't know is not worth knowing. Lord! The times we've had together."

We are privileged to live near one of the finest rivers in the country. Famous for both its salmon and trout and for its coarse fishing we all enjoy the Avon valley and its views from Castle Hill and Breamore Mill.

One of my favourite childhood books was 'The Wind in the Willows' by Kenneth Grahame (1908). It offers a whimsical and nostalgic view of comfortable Edwardian times but a recent article suggested it might offer the modern reader more. Beyond and beneath the picnic hampers and boating jollies is a vision of a life that can teach us to look differently at the world.

Of course we need to see it scientifically. We need to examine the data, not least to provide evidence of pollution, climate change, and the urgent need to attend to our environment. But the 'Wind in the Willows' might help us in a different way. The book offers a vision of the world as sacramental to be seen not only as 'data' but as 'testimony.' The natural world is not merely something made by God through the eons of time and evolution, it is something through which God is instinctively known.

We might recall when Ratty and Mole unable to sleep they offer to help Otter in his hunt for his missing child. As they drift down the river at dawn they are drawn by music "beautiful and strange and new." In a clearing they encounter a divine presence- Pan, or some primal God of nature. The Piper does not thunder or preach. He blesses and Mole and Rat fall silent. The sheer beauty of the scene leaves them in awe. The enchanting experience quickly passes but the lost otter cub is soon found. The imagery is drawn from classical mythology but the heart of its meaning is more Christian than Pagan. It's mysticism rests not on argument or definition but on trust in mystery. It is an Anglican sensibility found in the poetry of George Herbert and the meditations of Thomas Traherne. Its roots lie with Augustine for whom delight in the world deepened his search for the God who created it.

The 'Wind in the Willows' may offer nostalgia for comfortable Edwardian times but perhaps it can still speak to us. A vision of creation as sacramental gives us further reason to love and care for the natural world and may yet lead us to that which lies behind and beyond it.
