



Potted histories...whatever did happen to them?

Edward V was king of England for a few short months in 1483. Last seen in the Tower of London with younger brother, Richard of York, we all know what happened next and whodunnit. Shakespeare pronounced, so it must be so. Why go on?

Following the death of his father Edward IV, young Edward relocated from Ludlow, his seat as Prince of Wales, to reside in the King's royal lodgings in the Tower of London. He is recorded as playing with brother Richard, shooting at butts in the garden. They were not actually imprisoned in that it was traditional for the heir to the throne to prepare for coronation there. Then, on the due day, to ride in splendid procession from the Tower in the east, to Westminster Abbey in the west.

The coronation was planned for 22 June, and coins were being minted, when it was announced that Edward IV's marriage to Elizabeth Woodville was bigamous. That marriage was never popular at Court and old scores were definitely being settled. The heirs of an illicit marriage could not inherit land, least of all the Crown of England. That's convenient then.

Uncle Richard had, as Protector, quietly arranged it all. As the surviving senior heir to the throne he was then offered the Crown by the governing Parliamentary body. The whole process had been organised in the wink of a royal eye.

The Princes had in the meantime disappeared and no definitive English document survives that proves that they were killed. When Henry Tudor subsequently seized the throne he was happy to cite Richard's dastardly doings. His Parliament also accused Richard of all sorts of crimes, mostly invented, but not regicide!

Richard took the secret to his grave. Subsequent writers, historians, playwrights and artists have repeated and embroidered the tale. It is now orthodoxy.

But did they die and who killed them? Henry Stafford, Duke of Buckingham and a staunch supporter of both Richard and Henry is also cited, as is Henry, himself.

Two claimant Princes then surfaced, with supporters, and with both being defeated. The first, supported by Richard's sister, sailed from France for Dublin, and was crowned Edward V. His army was defeated by Henry's at Stoke. The victor put it about that the captured imposter was one, Lambert Simnel; he was actually pardoned because of his tender years; employed as a scullion in the royal kitchens.

The second, claiming to be the younger Richard of York also sailed from France, with even wider European support. Defeated by Henry, he was captured and executed but not until he had confessed under duress to being one Perkin Warbeck.

History has, to date, generally accepted these two aliases in the absence of hard evidence of what actually happened to the Princes.

The skeletons of two small boys were discovered in the Tower of London in 1674...



Don't Dump It, Dish It! New Forest Pumpkin Campaign Offers a Tasty Fix

This Halloween the New Forest National Park Authority and the New Forest Marque are urging people to think twice about how they discard their leftover pumpkins and instead to turn them into quick, easy and delicious meals.

Each year pumpkins left on the Forest floor pose a real threat to the free-roaming animals that make the New Forest so special. While it might seem like a harmless seasonal offering, pumpkins can cause serious digestive issues in ponies and discarded pumpkins attract animals to roadsides, increasing the risk of accidents.

'Every year we find pumpkins left all over the New Forest, often by well-meaning people who are unaware that they can be harmful to wildlife and livestock,' said James Masser from the New Forest National Park Authority. 'They can cause stomach issues such as colic and choke in ponies, which can be potentially fatal if not spotted and treated.'

The animals seen grazing freely in the New Forest aren't wild, they are owned and cared for by local Commoners, whose families have lived and worked in the Forest for generations. If their animals fall ill from eating dumped food waste, it can have devastating effects on their health and the livelihoods of their owners.

To raise awareness and offer a positive alternative, the New Forest Marque local produce scheme has partnered with local chef Sutti Se-Upara, owner of <u>Anissa's Thai Kitchen and Deli</u> in Lyndhurst, to demonstrate just how easy it is to cook with leftover pumpkin.

In a short video filmed at his restaurant, Sutti prepares a fragrant Thai-style Pumpkin and King Prawn Stir Fry using a pumpkin locally sourced from Dan Tanner's Sopley Farm - also a New Forest Marque member, known for its pick-your-own produce.

Sutti said: 'Pumpkins come in all shapes and sizes and are often used in Thai cooking as they are naturally sweet and versatile. This stir fry is quick and simple and a great way to use up leftovers.' Those unable to cook with their leftover pumpkin are encouraged to compost it or cut it up and add it to their food waste bin. Anyone who sees pumpkins dumped on the Forest is asked to collect them if it is safe to do so. If that's not possible, the location should be reported to Forestry England on 0300 067 4600, ideally using a 'what3words' location reference if available.

The Pumpkin and King Prawn recipe is available on the <u>New Forest Marque website</u>. A short-form video of the collaboration will be published at the end of October on the @newforestmarque and @newforestnpa social media channels.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting of WOODGREEN PARISH COUNCIL held in Woodgreen Reading Room on Tuesday 14th Oct 2025 at 7.30pm

25/26.77 Members present: Lance Benest (LB)(Chair), John Clarke (JC), Helena Datta (HD), Mark Flannigan (MF), Stewart Hall (SH), Guy Rafferty (GR) and Pete Skinner (PS)

Also present: Amanda Johnson (Parish Clerk), Karen Hunt and Lindy Harper from Play Matters

Apologies for Absence: Janet Richards, NFDC District Councillor.

25/26.78 Declarations of interest: None

25/26.79 Defibrillators: Report from Ian Gemmell (Chair of Hale PC) regarding Hale and Woodgreen defibrillators. - Ian Gemmell was unable to attend.

25/26.80 Minutes of previous meeting held on 09/09/2025.

25/26.80.1 Following a review of the minutes, it was then unanimously **RESOLVED** that the minutes be accepted as an accurate record. The minutes were duly signed by the Chairman.

25/26.80.2 Matters arising from previous minutes not appearing as agenda items.

Forestry England (FE) - FE will supply some dragons teeth to be used as replacements throughout the village. WPC are in discussion with FE regarding clearing the viewpoint at Castle Hill.

25/26.81 Public Participation: No members of the public were present.

25/26.82 Proposed village play area: Karen Hunt and Lindy Harper updated councillors on the progression of the proposed new play area. Play Matters now have a bank account set up. They have committed that the area to be used for the play area will be the top of Halls Field. The design remains the same and will cover about 250 sq metres. They await the outcome of their resubmission for a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) grant of £67,200. A planning application has been drafted and a Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) report (which must be submitted with the application) has been commissioned. The group will focus on fundraising efforts over the coming months. Play Matters asked the parish council if they would fund, or loan, the £2000 required for the planning application (£800) and the BNG report (£1200).

Following a lengthy discussion, the unanimous feeling of the councillors is that the parish council would like to see Play Matters demonstrate the community engagement for this project through fundraising efforts; they believe this to be a critical aspect of any new project within the village as such events evidence a level of support and engagement by the wider community. Whilst Play Matters have held the view that any fundraising should only take place once planning permission was received the Parish Council felt that was not a prerequisite step, based on other community initiatives it is critical to mobilise and gather support from the village as early as possible to build and maintain support.

The parish council did agree that they will submit the planning application on behalf of Play Matters, which will reduce the cost to £400, however the parish council are unable to make any further financial contributions at this stage.

As a reminder, WPC have agreed the use of land for this project and have also agreed to pay for the legal costs which will be incurred from the peppercorn lease for the land.

25/26.83 Report by New Forest District Councillor: Cllr Richards was unable to attend.

25/26.84 Planning:

PS and HD visited all the sites and had no issues with the proposed works and therefore recommended to accept the decision of the National Park Authority Tree Officer. This was unanimously agreed.

25/26.85 Meetings Attended: No meetings were attended.

25/26.86 Speed Indicator Devices in Woodgreen and general speeding throughout the Forest. WPC is in consultation with HCC and NFDC regarding the installation of posts for the SIDS, this is a very slow process. LB and AJ will continue to liaise with HCC and NFDC to take this project forward. Councillors expressed their concern at recent animal deaths in the New Forest and would like to liaise with other parishes and Forest organisations to try to reduce the number of deaths. WPC will request an agenda item at the NW Quadrant meeting to discuss this.

25/26.87 Village Maintenance and Parish Council Property (including the cemetery, roads, hedges, footpaths, ditches):

Fence - Fence repairs along Halls Field will be carried out this winter.

Fallen tree - During high winds a tree fell from Gussy's copse blocking Common Road. This was cleared very quickly by Nigel Harris and the fence repaired by Jason Steward at a total cost of £249.00. **Hedges** - Steve Anton will carry out the annual hedgecutting for WPC.

25/26.88 Cemetery:

A working party was held on Sunday 12th October to tidy some of the older graves which are no longer regularly maintained. Many thanks to Stewart Hall who organised the morning and to the non-councillors who came along to help. A second session will be held on 26th October.

Two new benches have been installed and an existing bench repaired. There was evidence that the bins are being used for the disposal of dog waste, this is prohibited and signage will be installed to inform the public.

WPC will enter into a contract with NFDC for the collection of business waste from the cemetery; this was signed and will be returned to NFDC to allow collections to take place.

25/26.89 Financial report, Review of Ongoing Budget and approval of payments.







"This Time Next Week" by Leslie Thomas OBE

In the 1970's and 80's Thomas's publisher, Pan, doggedly promoted a format of either Racy front covers featuring provocatively posed nymphets, with the inference of a bawdy romp, or a saucy seaside style cartoon, a policy which I imagine may have alienated a raft of potential female readers. A shame, because his stories, many set around the 1940's, are firstly poignant and amusing. His popular "Virgin Soldiers", although not a favourite of mine, is a case in point, and of which Thomas wasn't that enamoured himself, calling it "a beginner's novel". The books can rude, but never offensive and he paints some great landscapes, filling them with funny interludes and engaging characters; remember "Dangerous Davies"? The hapless sleuth brought to life, rather indifferently, by Peter Davison in "The Last Detective", and currently enjoying a revival on one of the Freeview channels. And I kind of like Thomas himself, not only from dimly remembered TV interviews; OK I know he's got a girl's name*, he's Welsh - although I don't hold that against him, he had a moustache (that neither), and he was an incredibly successful and wealthy writer. All this and yet I still like him. Well he did live locally and I have it on good authority that he was a very agreeable man. My wife's cousin was his gardener when he lived next door to Ted Heath in The Close in Salisbury, and her cousin will not hear a critical word against him, which is good enough for me - of course it has to be. And he was actually even more local than that; after Salisbury he moved to Tichbourne Farm, Redlynch, from whence he would enjoy a pint or three in The Kings Head.

This Time Next Week was published in 1964 and is the author's moving account of his early life when he was tragically orphaned at the age of 12, after his mariner father was lost at sea and his mother died a few months later. He and his brother were separated and he was dispatched into a Dr Barnardo's home. He hears nothing of his sibling for another 18 months and with no other family contact, he is isolated in the London suburbs during the blitz with 100 similarly displaced children; a far cry from his small-town Welsh roots. Eloquently capturing the melancholy of his grim circumstances, Thomas does so without any sense of bitterness or self-pity. Instead he dwells on the positive things to draw on as he recounts these times with a wry, gallows sense of humour. The book presents a different facet to the more salty offerings and gives the impression of a man with an optimistic outlook on life, despite some appalling setbacks. I was surprised at the book and after reading it I think my appreciation of Thomas is further enhanced. Content aside, this well-thumbed paperback in the Hale Village Hall Library held another attraction for me; it's one of those rarities that smell of chocolate! Just a sniff of its fragrant, sepia tinged pages and I was powerless to resist.



Record-breaking total raised at the Stars Appeal's 20th Walk for Wards

The Stars Appeal, Salisbury Hospital's Charity, have announced that their 20th Walk for Wards raised a record-breaking total of £166.946.

Over 2,100 walkers registered to take part in the charity's sponsored walk on Sunday, July 6, at Wilton House.

Participants walked 3k, 5k,10k or the new 15k route to thank Salisbury District Hospital for the care they or their family have received, with some dedicating their walk in memory of a friend, parent, sibling or child.

As part of the 20th event celebrations, walkers also enjoyed live entertainment from local musicians whilst picnicking on the lawns.

Chair of the Stars Appeal Ambassadors and Consultant Surgeon Graham Branagan said: "This record-breaking total is a testament to the incredible support and generosity of our local community. I want to say a massive thank you to everyone who took part, sponsored somebody, volunteered, or helped organise Walk for Wards for making the 20th event so special. The money raised helps us provide the very best care for thousands of patients and their families across the hospital. Registration for Walk for Wards 2026 is now open, and we hope the community will join us on July 5 at Wilton House."

This year's event surpassed the £150,051 raised in 2024 and the record-breaking £157,922 raised in 2023. Money raised from the sponsored walk will go towards the £2million the Stars Appeal aims to raise to fund the latest equipment, enhancements to buildings, and ongoing projects across the hospital, which include support for people with cancer, Stars Appeal Wi-Fi, emergency patient clothing, play therapy equipment and a dedicated play assistant on the Children's Unit.

Burgate Manor

At the junction of Salisbury Road and the A338 in Fordingbridge readers may have noticed a pretty thatched cottage. This was the North Lodge for Burgate Manor, which is now the other side of the A338 bypass. It was intended as a picturesque welcome for visitors. The main entrance lodge near the town centre was originally a similar thatched cottage but this was destroyed by fire in 1866.

Burgate Manor was once surrounded by fields and parkland and was the home of the leading landowner in the town. The present building replaced an earlier manor house which stood a few hundred feet to the north. This older manor was recorded in the Domesday Book as belonging to the King, but it passed to the Bulkeley family in 1446 after the previous owner, John de Leckhull was murdered by his servants. They held it until Sir Dewy Bulkeley married Anne Coventry which eventually led to John Coventry, eldest son of the 6th Earl of Coventry, inheriting the estate. He was followed by a confusing number of John Coventrys.



It was John Coventry, the eldest son of George William, Earl of Coventry, who commissioned the building of the existing manor in 1811. The building stands on an imposing site overlooking the river Avon and is in the Gothic style of architecture. On the river side the central full height curved bay is designed to look like a castellated tower. The main entrance is through an impressive porch, which has the date 1811 and the Coventry coat of arms over it.

The manor has many interesting features. The front entrance has the unusual feature of sliding doors built into it. This leads into a small entrance porch with a vaulted ceiling which is unusual in that it is made of stone when most gothic revival vaults were usually made of wood. A small cupboard behind the shutters of the dining room window would have held a chamber pot for the use of the gentlemen when the ladies had withdrawn. The staircase is top lit by a large fanlight and has cast metal stair balusters with a mahogany handrail that terminates in a life like snake's head. Many of the doors have sliding latches embellished with the Coventry coat of arms. Some of the roof timbers are reputed to be reused ships timbers.

In 1857 John Coventry, who had been a Church of England curate decided to convert to the Catholic church. His family were incensed and would have disinherited him had previous wills not disallowed it. When his father died in 1871, he inherited and moved in with his wife Catherine and their twelve children. In 1872 he built the Catholic Church, now on the Salisbury Road, but then in open fields. John died in 1897 but left the estate in financial ruin. Between 1898 and 1900 many of the estate lands were sold off. The buildings on the Salisbury Road and on the Whitsbury Road were built by developers at this time. The Coventry family retained the house until 1939 when it was advertised for sale along with 114 acres of land. The property owned the trout fishing rights on three quarters of a mile of the river Avon. There was no electric lighting and water came from a well room in the basement cellar, that had an oil-fired pump for raising water into a tank in the roof. There was a walled kitchen garden with vineries and a peach house, a boat house and a gardener's cottage. The building was bought by Imperial Chemical Industries (ICI) and is now owned by the Game and Wildlife Conservancy Trust. It is not open to the public but documents relating to the house and pictures of the interior and exterior can be viewed on application to Fordingbridge Museum.





The month of November begins with a time for remembering, and the first two Sundays are dedicated to this. On the first Sunday of November, we will celebrate the feasts of All Saints and All Souls, when we have the opportunity to remember our loved ones whom we have lost. Where can we find the hand that will dry
The tears that the heart is crying--

There's but one place to go and that is to God And, dropping all pretence and pride, We can pour out our problem without restraint And gain strength with Him at our side—

Together we stand at life's crossroads And view what we think is the end, But God has a much bigger vision And he tells us it's only a bend--

For the road goes on and is smoother, And the "pause in the song" is a "rest," And the part that's unsung and unfinished Is the sweetest and richest and best-- So rest and relax and grow stronger, Let go and let God share your load, Your work is not finished or ended, You've just come to "a bend in the road."

As winter approaches and the days become colder and darker, it is easy to sometimes dwell on the sadder memories and forget the good times. But as we continue on our journey, we should never forget the loving care of our Heavenly Father. It's important not to be afraid of the 'bends in the road' as they may mean new opportunities and chances of fresh starts.

At the end of November, we move into the liturgical season of Advent, the Churches New Year, when we prepare to welcome Christ as the Light of the World at Christmas. Advent expresses our longing for light, giving us a sense of purpose and a reason to concentrate on good memories because God is always shining His love and light towards us, guiding our pathways and keeping us heading on our journey through life, moving in the right direction and able to competently and hopefully, negotiate those 'bends in the road'.

Returning then to consider our own journeys and the path that we walk, whether it's on a straight course when all is well or the times when we come to the 'bend in the road'. Whatever our personal trajectory, we need to persevere and stay strong in the faith of the One who walks beside us, shining His love-light towards us, guiding our pathways and keeping us heading in the right direction.
