

#### Potted histories...

Henry I, born in Selby Yorkshire, 2 years after the Battle of Hastings, eventually ruled England for 35 years (1100-1135 AD). 4th son of William the Bastard and the first Matilda in our tale, he inherited next to nothing on his Father's death, ceding Normandy and England to older brothers Robert and William II respectively. Present when William was killed hunting in the Forest, possibly on his own orders, he rushed to Winchester to grab the Treasury and was crowned King of England 3 days later.

After 5 years of brotherly strife Henry took control of Normandy too, imprisoning his brother for the rest of Robert's life, the alternatives being execution or blinding. Brotherly love indeed. The Anglo-Norman kingdom was reunited again, condemning England to centuries of strife with their French neighbours. But that's for later.

At home, he married Matilda (No.2), a direct descendant of Anglo-Saxon Kings, including Alfred, which helped cement his position with his new subjects. She had taken orders and was a nun, which then had to be rescinded for them to marry and have their children, William and Matilda (No.3). Henry, in spite of his own church education and the earlier expectation of a religious career, decided to take numerous mistresses as well and had at least 22 illegitimate children.

Henry is generally considered a good egg, as Kings go. Fluent in English as well as courtly French, he established peace in England and had reasonable relations with Scotland too. He reversed many of the bad laws introduced by his brother including, for example, the right of nobles to pillage their local settlements. Spoil-sport. He also established a national system of justice, and reformed the coinage.

Relationships with Popes and archbishops weren't quite so good as the latter attempted to establish greater powers over Church matters thus reducing Henry to a rubber stamp, had there been such a thing.

Henry's reasonable expectation was that, although he only had 2 legitimate children, the succession question was settled. However, his wife Matilda (No.2) then died, followed by his only legitimate son, William. On the 25th November 1120, Henry sailed for England from Barfleur. He was followed by his son and the son's friends in the recently refitted *White Ship*. Everyone on board the latter, crew and passengers, was blind drunk. Some disembarked before sailing, horrified at the drunken behaviour. Those who remained ordered the Captain to race the recently departed King's ship. Struggling to leave the harbour in the November gales the *White Ship* hit a rock and all but one of 300 passengers drowned, including the heir to the English throne. He drowned trying to save his half-sister Matilda (No.4) The Captain, it is said, committed suicide, drowning by his own hand.

Henry was thus forced to favour his nephew Stephen as his heir. Stephen was married to Matilda (No.5), his Queen. Henry's daughter (No.3), was married to the Holy Roman Emperor and was thus Empress Matilda, which helps a bit with the confusion. By now numbers 1, 2 and 4 were dead, which also helps the reader. And me!

When the Holy Roman Emperor died, Matilda (No.3), the Empress, returned home. Henry changed his mind on the succession and now named his daughter his heir. On Henry's death, Stephen legged it to England to claim the throne, with Matilda (No.5), his Queen. No.3 wasn't happy at this and claimed it for herself.

The two Matildas (3 and/or 5), whatever, went head to head over the English Crown for the next 15 years, a period known as the Anarchy. For the winner, watch this space. (David Mussell).

24.71 TO RECEIVE ANY APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE: - Cllr Lavis

**23.72 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST** - To receive declarations of interest in respect of matters contained in this agenda (in accordance with the Localism Act 2011).

Cllr Vickery declared an interest in Item 24.75 Application No. 24/00526LDCE

#### **24.73 MINUTES**

24.73.1 It was unanimously RESOLVED to approve the minutes of the meeting held on 7th May 2024.

24.73.2 Note matters arising from the minutes not elsewhere on the agenda.

Alderholt Planning Application APP/D1265/W/23/3336518 — Cllr Lavis was not able to attend the inquiry due to a date change, however he prepared a statement which was read out in support of the refusal of the application to build 1700 in Alderholt.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) – Hale PC has been successful in a grant bid and can now receive up to £2,400 from NFDC towards the Speed Indictor Devices which have been purchased.

#### 24.74 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Two parishioners spoke regarding issues along Hale Purlieu/Ladies Mile in relation to traffic issues including:

- 1) Parking opposite properties which inhibits access
- 2) Parking on the verges at all is this allowed?
- 3) The need for traffic to pass each other causing cars to go onto the verge, increasing erosion.

Recently some residents have placed logs/sticks opposite their properties to prevent parking which can severely hinder access to their properties. Some of these have been removed and been thrown onto residents driveways or onto the open forest damaging some important plants. Parked cars also often turn in residents driveways which causes erosion to drives and has nearly caused accidents. This matter was discussed further under 24.77

24.75 PLANNING APPLICATION - To consider the response to the following applications.

Application number: 24/00383CAC

Proposal: Single storey extension; alterations to doors and

windows; cladding; parapet walls (demolition of existing outbuilding)

Location: Mole End, HATCHET GREEN, HALE, SP6 2NB

Hale Parish Council recommended permission for an application for works on this site in 2021 and would also recommend permission for this application which is an amended from the previous application. Hale PC believes the proposals are an improvement to the current building; the materials being used are in keeping with the natural environment, the site is not visible at all to others and the proposed new building has a lower pitch than the building which is currently there.

To note the response for the following application (response has been submitted) -

Application number: 24/00526LDCE

Proposal: Application for a Certificate of Lawful Development

for continued use of land and garage for the parking of vehicles.

Location: The Nook, TETHERING DROVE, HALE, SP6 2NH

This application was agreed via email to meet the decision date of 20<sup>th</sup> June. This application was not assessed against the policies within the Local Plan but asked if the Parish were aware of any supporting or contradictory evidence with regard the application. Hale PC agreed to recommend

Option 1 - We recommend PERMISSION, for the reasons listed below, but would accept the decision reached by the National Park Authority's Officers under their delegated powers. Hale Parish Council is not aware of any contradictory evidence regarding this application and is happy to accept the testimonies which have been submitted in support of this application

**24. 76 HARRY'S MEADOW** - Cllr Vickery attended the New Forest National Park Planning committee meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> May to speak on behalf of Hale PC against the application 24/00102(FULL) – Use of land as a seasonal campsite for 50 pitches for no more than 60 days in a calendar year. Cllr Richards (NFDC) also attended and spoke against the application. The application was approved with conditions for 3 years. This decision has not yet been published by the NPA as the applicant is required to meet certain mitigating and bio-diversity conditions (or go a substantial way towards meeting them) before approval is finalised. Hale PC has no information as to whether the campsite will be operating in 2024.

#### 24.77 HALE PURLIEU VERGES -

HPC has had discussions with the National Trust, Natural England, Highways and The Verderers for many years regarding parking on the verges along Hale Purlieu/Ladies Mile and the erosion of the verge due to traffic passing each other; however a solution has not been reached. Parking on verges in the New Forest is unauthorised, however this information is not always known (particularly to tourists) and parking on these verges is not policed. Damaging an SSSI is a criminal offence

Some residents whose driveways are not perpendicular to the road can have difficulty accessing their property if parking occurs opposite and therefore have used logs/sticks to prevent this. This has led to much discussion on the local social media site Nextdoor and some residents have had the sticks/logs thrown onto their properties. Hale Parish Council would note that Hale resident Jonathon Hilton-King was not responsible for this action as was stated in social media.

Hale PC are meeting with Ryan Scott from the National Trust in July to discuss the situation and possible solutions.

Speed Indicator Device – Approval has now been agreed from National Trust and The Verderer's to allow sleeves to be installed along Hale Purlieu which will hold posts for the Speed Indicator Devices. Cllr Gemmell will now ask Highways to go ahead with installation.

#### 24.78 EXTERNAL MEETINGS - To receive reports from external meetings attended.

Hale Village Hall Management Meeting 9<sup>th</sup> May — Hale Village Hall will hold an Open Day on Friday 30th August which will be a drop-in starting with tea at 4pm followed by the AGM and then drinks in the evening. It will be a celebration of funding received for hall improvements and the local MP and the press will be invited

Planning Training — Fordingbridge Town Council hosted a training event - "Introduction to Planning for Local Councils" presented by Steve Tilbury, Planning Consultant. Cllr Gemmell attended.

Planning Committee - Cllr Vickery attended to represent Hale PC and present their report as noted in 24.76. Cllr Kyle questioned the lack of regard of the recommendations of the parish councils at planning committees and whether this is common throughout the New Forest. It was suggested this might be an agenda item for the NW Quadrant meeting in September.

**24.79 USE OF HATCHET GREEN BY HALE SCHOOL** It was agreed to accept a request by Hale school to use Hatchet Green for their Family Fun Day on 13<sup>th</sup> July. Any use of vehicles on the Green must be limited to unloading and no barbeques are permitted.

**24.80 SERVICE LEVEL AGREEMENT** It was **RESOLVED** to continue a Service Level Agreement between Hale Parish Council and NFDC Corporate Trees to inspect the trees adjacent to the village hall every three years (or more frequently if deemed necessary) to ensure their safety. The cost of each survey will be approximately £250.00.

**24.81 INSURANCE POLICY** It was **RESOLVED** to renew the insurance policy with Hiscox Insurance through A.J. Gallagher Insurance Brokers at a cost of £488.66. This includes cover for the Speed Indicator Devices and has increased minimally from last year.

#### "The Scotch Whisky Book" by Mark Skipworth

It was not a braw bricht moonlit nicht the nicht, when we finally reached The Glencoe Inn, beside Loch Leven in Ballachulish. A noggin at The Drovers Inn: Rob Roy's favoured watering hole in Ardului. had detained us and I myself was a little churlish after a fraught journey. An altercation with my sister-in-law had not helped. Exasperated at her constant nit picking. I had finally blown my top. giving her a sharp earful. In the Bar after a late supper, our group were tentatively reconnecting in discussion about our route to the Isle of Skye next day, and I nipped out to get a map from the car. A fog had rolled in from the Loch and was so dense that I had to use the key fob to locate the car. I reached in, chose a Road Atlas rather than the map, and locked the doors. The interior light faded & I was engulfed by the clinging fog, visibility no more than a couple of feet. As I stepped away from the vehicle, an unearthly guttural, grunting noise made the hairs on my neck rise. I experienced an irrational, fleeting terror as something touched my leg and I sensed a scuffling movement around my feet. A creature had emerged from the Loch and was searching for human flesh to feast on. I pressed the key fob, and in the dim glow of the interior light, I saw that I was surrounded by seven or so piglets, with their mother, an enormous Sow, foraging in the earth close by. Idiot! Returning to the Bar chastened and foolish. I was heartened to find that my brother had ordered me a pint of dark. malty Scottish bitter and arranged for the landlord to take us on a whisky odyssey that very evening.

My sister-in law and my own travelling companion; later to become my wife, chose whisky-macs; ginger wine with blended whisky – our genial landlord would not contemplate using malt. This was a poor choice, too strong, and in the words of "Ledbelly" Huddie Ledbetter, it was "Goodnight Irene" for those two. My brother and I stuck to the malts that the landlord placed before us, along with a jug of water. First the honeyed warmth of a "Jura" and as the evening progressed, the mildly peaty pleasure of "Old Pulteney", until late into the night when we were introduced to the medicinal "Lagavulin", and finally a peat-sodden, smoky "Laphroaig". Our taste palates were educated during that memorable journey, and the Islay malts, normally unpalatable to Whisky Virgins, had been conquered. Although actually not so memorable, because by midnight the three of us, landlord, brother and myself, were so befuddled that we would have sampled petrol. The morning's bar bill was a sobering reminder of our "education", and the landlord? Nowhere to be seen - his puckish wife stated with a wry smile, that he was suffering from an alcohol injury!

"The Scotch Whisky Book" is a more affordable introduction to the delights of a dram and, dare I say it, a more sagacious way to approach the most unique liquor in the world. Following a fascinating insight into all aspects of whisky distilling and its history, there is a brief summary for many of the commonly available brands, malts & blended, together with tasting notes. I keep a pocket version - handy if an unusual bottle comes my way. Savouring a wee dram is unlike other forms of imbibing, there is such variety that it really is an odyssey, and don't be afraid to start with a mixer, after all, many brands recommend a little water – but not chlorinated/fluorinated tap water. Plan your own odyssey, maybe with a little more restraint than myself, and always remember; please read sensibly.



#### Cricket

If you take a tour round the beautiful Breamore House near Fordingbridge, amongst the other treasures you will see, is a painting of, "The Boy with a Bat" by Thomas Hudson. This was painted about 1760 and is one of the earliest paintings of a cricketer known to exist. It shows Walter Hawkesworth Fawkes from Farnley in Yorkshire. Walter is shown holding a curved bat over his shoulder and two stumps in his left hand.

Cricket is believed to have started as a game for children in Saxon times in an area of dense woodland called The Weald in Southeast England. It gradually became a game played by adults with a reference to it being played by men as early as 1550s. In 1611 two men were prosecuted for playing cricket on a Sunday. By the eighteenth century the game was well established and in the 1750s a cricket club was founded in the small village of Hambledon in Hampshire. This has given rise to the village being called the "cradle of cricket".

In the early days of the game the ball would have been delivered underarm. Early bats would have been similar to the shape of todays hockey sticks because the curved end would have been better at hitting a ball that was rolling along the ground. An early curved bat is on display in the Oval cricket ground in London. At first there were only two stumps separated by quite a large gap with a wide bail placed on the top. A comparatively late depiction of this two-stump arrangement is shown in a 1793 painting by John Opie called the "The Red Boy."

In a game of cricket between Hambledon and Kent in 1775 a player, nicknamed Lumpy Stevens was bowling to the greatest batsman of the time, John Small. After several balls had gone through the gap between the stumps it was decided that things had to change and a third stump was added. In the early days there was no restriction on the size or shape of the bat. In another game at Hambledon a batter used a bat that was as wide as the stumps. This was considered unsportsmanlike, so a maximum width of bat was specified from then on.

By the mid-eighteenth century, underarm bowling gave way to overarm delivery. Lumpy Stevens may have been one of the first to, "give the ball air." He certainly made a careful study of how the ball was affected by pace and length. Pitches were often on land that was used for agriculture and Stevens may have got his nickname from aiming at the lumps in the ground to deliver a ball that was difficult to deal with.

Gradually more and more rules were devised to specify how cricket was to be played. In the eighteenth-century gambling on cricket matches was widespread and the rules of cricket were codified to ensure there was a fair outcome for the punters. The earliest code

was produced in 1774 and since 1788 an agreed set of rules has been overseen by the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC). This club was set up on fields owned by Thomas Lord in Marylebone. The MCC at Lords is still the arbiter of the laws relating to cricket.

There are many pubs that have cricket related names such as The Cricketers pub overlooking the cricket pitch at Hartley Wintney in Hampshire. This pitch is the oldest continuously played ground in England the club having been formed in 1770. Closer to Fordingbridge there is The Bat and Ball pub in Breamore. Its name relates to the picture of The Boy with a Bat at Breamore House. If you call in for a pint raise a glass to Lumpy Stevens, John Small and the other pioneers of the game.

On the last weekend of June (Petertide) two people were ordained as deacons in the Church of England to serve in the Parish of Fordingbridge and Breamore & Hyde and Hale with Woodgreen. They will both serve as deacons, effectively "servants" for a year before, we hope both will be ordained again but this time as priests. But once ordained always ordained so even after being priested they will always also be deacons, leaders who serve. Their names are Ruth and Vicky. Ruth has been part of the parish for a few years as a Licenced Lay Minister and Vicky is joining us as a new team member.

We are so lucky in this parish to have four priests (three retired), two deacons and two Licenced Lay Ministers and we have several other people moving towards ordination. On the evening before their ordination another of our past trainees, Jo, was amongst 19 people ordained priest to serve in the Diocese of Winchester and currently serving at the Cathedral.

We all have different gifts and things we are no doubt better at but we all seek to serve the people of the whole parish and indeed, Luke, our Rector is given the "cure" of the parish which he shares with the Bishop Of Winchester, which effectively makes the Church of England available to anyone and everyone at times of their lives when they need the church.

Because we have 6 churches and often have up to 8 services on a Sunday across the parish we are all quite active given that most of us are retired or volunteers.

I am a Licenced Lay Reader and I take several services each month preaching at some of them. I really look forward to researching the bible passages set for the day and then trying to make them relevant to the people in the pews or chairs, because most of the situations that occur in the bible occur in our lives too – wars, family fall-outs, famines, floods, extreme wealth and poverty, and joy – it's all there. Whilst some things have changed very much the central truths of love and care remain.

Of course we don't spend all of our time in church dressed in a cassock tidying the prayer books as some TV programmes would have us, we visit schools and rest homes, hospitals and are invited into many other gatherings and some of us hold other offices like being a school governor at a church school. I'm a trustee for 12 nurseries and pre-schools run by the Diocese of Winchester.

You might be wondering how to tell the difference between us when in church and it's the stole or scarf that gives it away. The Lay Ministers always wear a blue scarf which is the same size as a priest's stole but the stoles are worn to match the church

seasons of the year and might be red, gold, white, purple or green and on some occasions black – usually black when wearing what is called "choir dress" which is a black or coloured cassock on top of which is a white surplice, which is usually quite long with very wide arms and is worn mainly for the very ancient services of Mattins and Evensong. As an LLM I still get to war a blue scarf on these occasions! (Good job I like blue!)

So I hope this is useful if you aren't familiar with the ordained and licenced offices of the Church of England.


