





Potted histories: The Anarchy, winner takes all...

There is no doubt that the Normans were never happier than when they were involved in a scrap, usually with family and about land and power.

On the death of Henry I (II35 AD) there was plenty of uncertainty as to what was to happen next. Henry had only recently re-unified Normandy and England, after dealing violently with his brothers; the succession on his own death was rife with confusion and opportunism.

His son, William, had drowned in the White Ship disaster, and his only legitimate heir was his sole daughter, the Empress Matilda. Henry had nominated her as his heir, but this was not universally popular among the nobles of the time. Her cousin Stephen (m.Matilda), Henry's nephew, was also in the running. Acting swiftly, Stephen was handily placed in Boulogne to rush across the Channel to claim the English throne and the treasury in Winchester. Matilda, and her new husband Geoffrey of Anjou were very slow off the mark, being in southern Normandy grabbing territory there.

Stephen thus acceded to the English throne, and was instantly embroiled in disputes with the Scots, Northern Barons, and the Welsh all flexing their muscles with the incomer, seeking lands, titles and influence. Much fighting, negotiating and trading ensued, mostly with a measure of success on the part of Stephen although he abandoned Wales as in the too difficult category. He was also running out of money.

Initially Empress Matilda did not actively asserted her claim to the throne. However this all changed in II38 when, with the help of her powerful half-brother, Robert of Gloucester, war was declared on Stephen, triggering revolts in Kent and south-West England. King David of Scotland joined her and invaded the North, as far as Yorkshire.

England descended into Civil War, known as the Anarchy. Stephen is generally recognised as an effective soldier, often leading from the front. The war ebbed and flowed across England until Stephen was captured at the battle of Lincoln, and imprisoned at Bristol. Now Matilda made her move to claim the throne, with the initial support of the Clergy. Moving to London however she met implacable opposition from the citizens and had to retreat. In the meantime the other Matilda, Stephen's Queen, had been keeping the King's cause alive during his absence.

So, for a short time, the two Matildas faced each other across the civil war divide. Queen Matilda was successful in gaining the support of London; the clergy changing sides too. Empress Matilda retreated to Winchester, and queen Matilda followed her, surrounding her forces. The Empress escaped, Stephen was eventually freed and the civil war continued.

The Anglo-Saxon Chronicle records that "there was nothing but disturbance, wickedness and robbery" Eventually exhaustion took over and the two sides came to terms. It was accepted that Stephen should continue as King and, on his death, Empress Matilda's son Henry should succeed him. The Norman regime ended and Plantagenet rule began. The Empress had her way, after all.... David Mussell

24/25.54 Declarations of interest: None

24/25.55 Parish Council Vacancy. One application was received and approved and it unanimously **RESOLVED** to co-opt Guy Rafferty as a member of Woodgreen Parish Council. Guy signed a Declaration of Acceptance and joined the meeting as a parish councillor.

24/25.56 Minutes of previous meeting held on 9/07/2024.

24/25.56.1 Following a review of the minutes, it was then unanimously **RESOLVED** that the minutes be accepted as an accurate record. The minutes were duly signed by the Chair.

24/25.56.1 Matters arising from previous minutes not appearing as agenda items.

Speed Indicator Device - AJ has contacted NFDC and they are looking into a temporary deployment at Castle Hill where sleeves for a post to hold the SID are located. LB has requested SIDs as an agenda item at the next NW Quadrant meeting to gauge lother local villages' experiences of them and their effectiveness.

Reading Room Allotment - A local resident has agreed to take on the allotment at the Reading Room.

24/25.57 Public Participation: Two members of the public were present but spoke during item 24/24.45 - Frithway.

24/25.58 Report by New Forest District Councillor.

Due to the election and holiday season few meetings have taken place.

Community Infrastructure Levy - More funds will be made available to bid for later on in the year.

24/25.59 Planning: To discuss the following application and agree recommendations.

Case Number 24/00777FULL

Proposal Single storey extension

Site Langtree House, Castle Hill, Woodgreen SP6 2AX

This application comprises amendments to a previous approved application, Councillors agreed there were no issues with the application and it was **RESOLVED** to recommend Option 1 PERMISSION but would accept the decision reached by the National Park Authority's Officers under their delegated powers.

Case Number 24/00812FULL

Proposal Extension; car port; outbuilding.

Site Frithway, Upper Densome Wood, Woodgreen SP6 2QU

The residents from Frithway presented the plans to the parish council. The current residence is in need of updating and the proposed plans aim to make it more energy efficient with an air source heat pump and cladding, along with features to improve it aesthetically such as a zinc roof. The application was discussed and councillors supported the proposed changes. It was **RESOLVED** to recommend Option 1 PERMISSION but would accept the decision reached by the National Park Authority's Officers under their delegated powers subject to DP36 (30% limitation) being met and verified by planners. WPC will also recommend that a habitable use restriction is placed on the outbuildings in perpetuity.

Case Number 24/00846CONS

Proposal Prune 1 x European beech

Site The old Post House, High Street Woodgreen, SP6 2AR

Case Number 24/00872TPO

Proposal Fell 2 x Silver Birch trees, Fell 1 x Himalayan Birch tree,

Prune 1 x Magnolia tree. (All trees above are part of W1 of TPO/0069/05)

Site Ty Gwyn, Lower Densome Wood, Woodgreen, SP6 2BE

HD and PS carried out site visits for both applications and had no issues with any of the proposed works and therefore recommended to accept the decision of the National Park Authority Tree Officer. This was unanimously agreed

The following application was received after the agenda was finalised.

Case Number 24/00777FULL
Proposal Single storey extension

Site The Old Post House, High Street, Woodgreen, SP6 2AR

This application comprises amendments to a previous approved application and councillors agreed there were no issues with the application and it was **RESOLVED** to recommend Option 5 - We are happy to accept the decision reached by the National Park Authority's Officers under their delegated powers.

24/25.60 Meetings Attended: No meetings have been attended.

The NW Quadrant meeting 15th July - HD and JC attended.

The Fawley Waterside housing development programme has been withdrawn and hence improvements to the A326 will be affected and scaled down.

Dark Skies - The principle of promoting Dark Skies is widely accepted however there is little legislation to enforce it.

Equestrians and footbridges - It was reported that some equestrians are using foot bridges which are unsuitable for horses, many of these bridges are being replaced throughout the New Forest.

Forestry England - 10,000 native trees have been planted this season including 6,000 oaks.

Village Hall AGM - SH attended. The Village Hall is in a very good financial position with good reserves and much work has been carried out in recent years - a new kitchen, painting and heating.

24/25.61 Bus Shelter Refurbishment Work has begun and the re-tiling of the roof has been completed. The windows will be installed over the next couple of weeks, the wood will be stained and the telephone kiosk re-painted. A plaque will be placed on the bus shelter stating and an opening ceremony will take place in autumn, details to be confirmed at the next meeting,

24/25.62 Village Maintenance and Parish Council Property (including the cemetery, roads, hedges, footpaths, ditches): To receive any updates & consider/approve any action and/or spending required.

Village Green - AJ has spoken to Forestry England who may be able to supply some low rails, if this has not occurred by the end of August WPC will look into purchasing the rails from another source.

Benches - Repairs to 2 benches have been carried out.

Lemgthsman - The lengthsman strimmed the permissive path behind the shop, mended/installed dragons teeth and cleared bramble on the common and at the cemetery.

The Common - WPC are concerned about the amount of brambles now growing on the common, particularly on the area up from Grace Lane to the main common. AJ spoke to Forestry England and their policy is that brambles are a natural habitat progression and they are not removed unless they restrict sight lines. WPC feels that some of the bramble areas are restricting sight lines and will assess which areas need to be cut back.

Hedges - Hedges and brambles have grown excessively this year, the hedge on the road to Breamore will be cut as usual by WPC in autumn, other areas will be assessed and cut if applicable. A message will be added to the parish magazine to remind homeowners of their duty to cut hedges on the roadside.

24/25.63 Cemetery - An application has been received to install a headstone, further details of the memorial will be brought to the council when received.

Maintenance - The kissing gate requires attention and two wooden benches are in need of repair. It was agreed to finance any repairs/replacements with funds which were left in legacy to the cemetery fund. SH will ascertain what works need to be undertaken.

24/25.64 Printer purchase - It was **RESOLVED** to purchase a new printer for use by the clerk (shared equally with Hale PC). GR will look into which printer may be most suitable.

24/25.65 Financial report, Review of Ongoing Budget and approval of payments:

A Play Area for the Children of Woodgreen

Following the recommendations of the Jubilee and Coronation committees that its legacy should include a play area for children, the Play Area for Woodgreen Group has been established to investigate, consult and propose on such an addition.

Currently, despite having a great village pub, village garden, church, village hall and village shop, there is no provision in Woodgreen for children of any age. A play area serves as a meeting point for children and their parents/grand-parents/friends/carers to come together, play and make new friends and acquaintances. The importance of mental health in children (and their parents) is well documented, as is the role play areas have in supporting our kids' mental health. Moreover, the dependence on technology to entertain children has become pervasive.

Our neighbouring villages (such as Redlynch and Martin) have recognised this need and provided play areas supported by their Parish Councils. Of course, these are accessible to Woodgreen children but does involve travel (and therefore adult availability), loses the community spirit and opportunity for chance encounters. Likewise, the lovely New Forest on our doorstep is an extension but not a replacement for what a designated play area offers.

From the Jubilee celebrations (where 33 mugs were distributed to Woodgreen children), it is estimated that we have between 30 to 40 children. Onto this we should also consider grandchildren, friends and the many visitors we get on a daily basis. Nevertheless, the case for a play area should not be reliant on an arbitrary threshold of the number of "resident users", but be seen as an asset that every proud village offers as a comprehensive and inclusive service to its residents and visitors.

Not only will the play area provide a central point for children to meet and play, but will contribute to the community's spirit, inclusiveness and financially by stimulating visitors to use the many other facilities offered by the village.

We recognise that location will be a key topic and will be thoroughly consulted upon. Space is limited and we need to work with what is available. It is also key that the nature of the play area respects what we already have, and importantly, reflects the type of New Forest village we are. It needs to embrace nature and the great outdoors. We will be investigating designs, costs (initial and on-going), funding and governance. We will be working closely with the Parish Council to seek their support: politically, locally, and financially.

We aim to conclude our consultations within 2024 and if successful, secure funding and permissions in early 2025, then with any works starting in late 2025.

A community survey (for our Woodgreen residents) will soon be available.



Ghost Signs

If you walk down Lord Mayor's Walk in York, you cannot fail to see a large advertisement painted on the end of a building. It reads, "Nightly Bile Beans Keep You Healthy, Bright Eyed and Slim." This is a brilliant example of a ghost sign. These are hand painted signs usually advertising shops, products or services. They were painted directly on the brickwork of buildings and date from the late nineteenth century to the mid twentieth century. Some, like the Bile Beans example mentioned above, are still very vivid whilst some are now very faded and more difficult to see.

Once your attention has been drawn to them, if you are like me, you will start looking up above the modern-day shopfronts and under the roof tops to find more examples. They are a tangible reminder of the people and businesses that came before us and give an important commentary on our cultural and social history.

Many are perfect examples of early advertising unconstrained by any regulation. Who would not want to be healthy, bright eyed and slim? Others merely proclaim services offered. Driving into Wimborne notice on the house that was once lived in by Gulliver, the notorious smuggler, a faded sign reading, "J. Page. Agricultural Implement Maker and Agent." In the centre of Ringwood under the gable end of a coffee shop a sign advertises, "Frampton and Sons, Corn, Seed, Cake, Hay and Straw Stores. In Rollestone Street in Salisbury there is a sign over a house advertising, "Hovis." Presumably, the house was a bread shop. This is a good example of why the signs are called ghost signs as it is so faded that it is very difficult to read.

The painters of the signs were itinerant artisans called, in a derogative way, "wall dogs". This was because they worked like dogs in all weather and were tethered to the wall they were working on. The occupation was a dangerous one, working at height exposed to the elements and using oil-based house paints that contained lead.

Not all ghost signs advertise shops, products or services. The attractive Georgian, Lord North Street in London, has ghost signs pointing to basement air raid shelters. These date from WW2 and remind us of the days when the Blitz was a real danger to what is now a peaceful elegant street. Nelson Street in York is a cul-de-sac with a large brick wall at the end of it. You have to have eagle eyes to spot, painted on the brickwork, "Victory". Was this, now very faded sign, painted on the wall by the residents to celebrate the end of WW1 or WW2? Did they perhaps, have a street party with this sign as the backdrop? More recently, in Northern Ireland, sectarian

paramilitary groups employed artists to paint large murals on the brick ends of the terraced houses in the areas they controlled. These have now been added to by non-political paintings commemorating people like George Best and visitors can be taken on a tour round Belfast looking at them.

If you visit Fordingbridge Museum, as you enter Kings Yard, look up to see a good example of a ghost sign. It is now very faded but luckily the Museum has a photograph of it shortly after it was re painted over a previous sign of similar design. It advertises F.C. West and Sons Saddlers and has an unusual design made to look like a scroll hanging from a rope. Please keep your eyes open for local examples of ghost signs and send us a photograph and note of the location. The museum would like to record these reminders of our cultural and social history.

"Campbells Kingdom" by Hammond Innis (Omnibus Edition + DVD)

I initially read this book as a boy and actually reviewed it as a piece of school work; a fairly pedestrian effort that only merited a B+, and a "could do better" comment from Johnny English. Hmm, don't know about doing better, but first, fast forward forty years or so and I discover the DVD whilst clearing my dear mother's bungalow – she liked Dirk Bogarde, and here, he is joined by a stellar cast including Stanley Baker, Barbara Murray, Sid James, John Laurie and James Robertson Justice! What a line up, and filmed at Pinewood Studios somehow you just know that you're in for an absolute blast, although I should say that the storyline is fairly edited in comparison to the book. Don't worry, the film is still fab. Cheesy and corny and just fabulous; Cucumber cool Dirk's wardrobe remains pristinely immaculate throughout, whilst all around get pretty grubby - a feature I've noticed in a few of his films.*

But the book! It's breathless - London based Bruce Campbell Wetheral has only months to live, when his estranged Grandfather dies and bequeaths him a parcel of land high in the Canadian Rocky Mountains. Grandpappy Campbell was a rogue and a swindler according those who lost money in his oil enterprise, and Bruce has endured a miserable existence, living in the long shadow cast by the belligerent old man, who insisted right up to his death, "there's oil in them thar hills", or words to that effect. Bruce travels to Canada and finds not only a hostile local community (obviously romantic interest excluded), but also a powerful businessman who is intent on finishing the Dam that will flood Campbells Kingdom. When Bruce discovers that geological readings have been tampered with; readings that may prove the presence of oil, the race is on as he decides to hire a wildcat drilling team to prove his Grandfathers belief, and clear his name along with his debts. Its touch and go as our ailing hero encounters dastardly deeds at every turn, but he's also got a few tricks up his own sleeve, and his mission soon becomes a dangerous game of Cat and Mouse. Will Bruce live to see his Grandfather exonerated? This is all set against a magnificent backdrop in the unforgiving Canadian mountains – be prepared for a rocky ride (sic); it's worth it.

I'd recommend the DVD <u>and</u> book, they are quite different, but both hugely enjoyable. Also being an omnibus, there is a second story; "The White South", another fine read, albeit a little gory. I shall definitely be on the lookout for other Hammond Innis titles in our Library. 

Help protect New Forest verges

Drivers are being reminded about the importance of not parking on verges in the New Forest.

The verges can look like muddy or grassy areas but are incredibly important habitats which support many different animals and rare plant species.

They're a separate designated feature of the New Forest's Sites of Specific Scientific Interest (SSSIs) so are legally protected against damage.

In addition, they are also a vital source of food for free-roaming livestock such as the New Forest pony and are a treasured part of the Forest landscape.

Parking on verges can obstruct access for the emergency services so people are instead being strongly encouraged to park in one of the 130 official car parks in the New Forest which are owned and managed by Forestry England.

Over the past decade, verges have been restored to their original state due to funding from the Verderers of the New Forest Higher Level Stewardship (HLS) scheme.

The Forestry England-led scheme, which delivers a range of projects to help protect the New Forest National Park's internationally-important wildlife and landscapes, runs a programme of work which has seen 26 miles of verges nursed back to life in various ways including the installation of short chestnut posts called dragon's teeth, and the creation of ditches or banks.

Animals such as slow worms and newts can be found in the habitats on verges, as well as plant species like chamomile, wild orchid and coral necklace.

The verges also contain high quality grazing land which attracts ponies and other animals.

Holly Fitzgerald, Verge Restoration Officer at Forestry England, helps to educate and inform the public about the importance of verges and not parking on them.

She said: 'Drivers don't realise that they have caused the erosion, and that other people will park there if they see cars in the area.

When you explain why this can cause damage most people get why they need to stick to the car parks.

I also work with residents to encourage them to park within their property, rather than on a verge outside their home.

'Together we can help protect these extremely important parts of the New Forest and reinstate many more miles which have been lost '



Our Grade 1 Listed 'Gem in the Forest' is in peril!

The roof of St. Mary's Church, Hale, has suffered severe batten failure to the lesser-seen rear of the building. Whilst a temporary repair in January 2024 to the southwest transept roof minimised internal damage, sadly, a second hole has since appeared; this time on the south nave roof, with water leaking in and staining a 17th Century painting of the words of the Creed. The current temporary repairs will be unlikely to last through the winter.

All of the permissions are now in place to repair the roof permanently this October, however, the £50,000 required is too huge a sum for such a small congregation, and time is quickly running out! So far, thanks to the incredible generosity of locals and the fundraising efforts by a small team of villagers, approximately half of the total repair cost has been met. However, no work can start until the contractors and architect are able to be paid in full. We urgently need your help to save our very special 'Gem in the Forest' to prevent the roof caving in this winter!

Reverend Canon Gary Philbrick - RIP

I am sure by now you will have heard of the sudden and tragic death of our former Rector Canon Gary Philbrick on 23rd July. He served as our Priest here in the Avon Valley Churches from 2013 – 2022, and will be remembered for the enthusiasm that he displayed in every facet of his life and ministry.

Gary was ordained in 1986 and served all his ministry in the Winchester Diocese. He was Priest at Maybush, Swaythling in Southampton, and Fawley on the other side of the New Forest. He was made Area Dean of Southampton in 2007 and an Honorary Canon of Winchester Cathedral in 2009. He came to serve in the Avon Valley Churches in 2013 until 2022, when he was appointed Assistant Archdeacon in Winchester Diocese and Chaplain of Winchester Cathedral.

On August 8th, over one thousand friends, colleagues, and former parishioners from all the parishes where he served and beyond, attended his funeral service at Winchester Cathedral. His son Craig in the eulogy that he gave for his foster-dad, described Gary as 'one in a million in life' and also as 'one in a million in death' as Gary died from a condition rarely seen in this country.


