

Astonishing History ...

A celebrity snake catcher

I recently saw a beautiful slow worm that had come out of hibernation and was basking in the sun next to where I was gardening. Although often mistaken for a snake, slow worms are in fact legless lizards. They eat slugs and snails so are a welcome sight in my garden. Readers may not realise that all six of the UK's native reptiles are to be found in the New Forest. These are adders, sand lizards, grass snakes, common lizards, the rare smooth snake and the slow worms. All New Forest reptiles are protected by law. Snakes are cold blooded with dry skins and get their body heat from the environment so the open sandy soil of the forest, that heats up quickly, is an ideal habitat for them. They hibernate in the winter and come out in the spring to warm up in the sun.

Adders are our only venomous snakes. Their name comes from the old English naedre meaning creeping thing. They have an unjustified bad reputation. They will only bite when cornered or threatened and bites are rarely life threatening, although, if bitten, medical attention is important. Traditional folk cures for adder bites are to apply the fat from a fried adder or to dip a bag containing the heads of an adder, toad and newt into water and then to apply the water to the wound.

The Brockenhurst area was the home of the famous snake catcher, Harry Mills, who was usually referred to by his nickname "Brusher." This was because he would earn some money by sweeping the cricket pitch at Balmer Lawn between innings. Brusher was born in 1840 in Emery Down and after working as a labourer and gardener, went to live in a charcoal burners hut near Brockenhurst. From there he made his living as a snake catcher. Photographs and paintings of him show him as a country character. He had a long forked beard, smoked a pipe and wore a wide brimmed hat and gaiters. The latter were to protect him from snake bites. He is depicted with the tools of his trade. These were a forked stick, which he called his staff of office, which he used for driving the snakes out of the undergrowth and pinning them down. Round his neck hung a pair of metal tongs for picking them up.

Life in his bracken and turf hut would have been simple but he devised a variety of ways of making money. Some live snakes would be sent to London Zoo to feed birds of prey and other snakes. Some he sold locally to Lord Londesborough at Lyndhurst who used them to feed his falcons and who would pay a shilling for every live snake. He also sold ointment from the fat of fried adders to be used as a cure for snake bites. He claimed that this was also good for alleviating rheumatism. He was often bitten himself and he would cut the site of the bite with his pen knife and apply his ointment. He would also boil snakes and sell the skeletons to tourists.

He was a regular at local fairs where he would display snakes, demonstrate his skills and sell his ointment and skeletons. Despite having been born with a cleft palate, making his speech sometimes difficult to understand, he loved telling anecdotes and talking to people about his snake catching and lifestyle. He soon became a local celebrity. In 1897 there was an article about him in Country Life Magazine and others in publications such as the Sporting Journal and Boys Own Paper. This made him a national celebrity and he would regularly entertain people brought to see him by tourism guides. They could even buy postcards depicting him from the local shops.

Brusher was a sociable chap and loved to go for two pennies' worth of rum and some bread, cheese and pickle in the Railway Inn in Brockenhurst. He had been healthy for most of his life but he did have to go into the local workhouse to recuperate after catching flu. He would keep himself clean by visiting a relative in Lyndhurst for a bath and change of clothing. In 1903 he said, "I can't get about as I did. I took influenza thirteen years ago and it made me weak. Still, I can't complain. I am sixty-three and only bad weather takes me in my chest." In 1905 his hut was burnt down, some said by the park authorities to stop him claiming squatters' rights. He was very upset by this and died shortly afterward after living in the outbuildings of the Railway Hotel. His nephew describes at his inquest how he seemed his usual jolly self after drinking two pennyworths of rum. He found him shortly afterwards in one of the outbuildings, "dead but sitting in a natural position."

His grave in St Nicholas' Church is marked by a marble headstone carved with a depiction of him in his distinctive outfit. This was paid for by a public subscription. The Railway Hotel is now called the Snake Catcher and displays Brusher memorabilia. It is definitely worth a visit. You might even have a glass of rum in Brusher's memory but I doubt it will cost you a penny!

"Hag-Seed" by Margaret Atwood

Shakespeare's writing is a mystery to me. There I've said it now, or to put it another way; "spaketh he in riddling tongue of noisome purblind waffle-headed Dullard". At school his tales were enjoyable, but I had an English teacher to unravel the mystery. When left to my own devices I struggled, whilst the words flowed the meaning did not, such a shame because I like the stories and characters. Anyway just recently I discovered the following:

In 1917 the great Virginia Woolf and her husband founded The Hogarth Press with an ideal to publish the avant-garde and promote the best new writing of the time. Keeping with that tradition, in 2015 Hogarth launched its Shakespeare project, where popular writers were tasked with re-imagining Shakespeare's work in a current setting, and a series of eight books were published. I've read a couple (from our Library) & I have enjoyed them. I'm sure many people will say this has been done countless times before and that Shakespeare's influence is at the heart of many a modern classic, well fine, but without being told that I would not necessarily know it. Perhaps because I'm a rascally wide-chapp'd freckled whelp hag-born*
...... To strangle a phrase, and to illustrate why I find the Bard's text so bewildering!

What Margaret Atwood has done is create a story with "The Tempest" at its heart. The play is not retold, well only in very small snippets. Instead we have its staging as the storyline, with Shakespeare's characters used to wreak havoc in real time. Stay with me, it is worth it.

Fifty-something Felix Phillips has been ousted from the cosy position of Artistic Director for the Makeshiweg festival — a required venue for serious Shakespearian theatre-goers, and where he has been simultaneously feted and hated for some original interpretations of the great man's work. To add misery to this dismissal, he has recently lost his beloved wife and child, both tragically dead. Felix retreats into self-imposed obscurity, licking his wounds, the longing for retribution festering as former, janus-faced associates rise to lofty prominence, basking in acclaim that should be his. Over ten long years a gnawing resentment is nurtured, until a minor position arises that gives him the opportunity to resume teaching and directing his beloved Shakespeare, albeit in a men's prison. As Felix gets to know his new pupils, a cunning plan develops within his vengeful mind, and with the help of these freshly acquired acolytes this devious scheme is set in motion; to take down those who have ruined his life.

Margaret Atwood is well known for "The Handmaids Tale", amongst other things, and this book is similarly terrific. There is also a great summary of the original play at the end.



Minutes of the Hale Parish Council Annual Meeting held on Tuesday 7th May 2024 at 7pm in Hale Village Hall (Downstairs)

Councillors Present: Donnell, Gemmell (Chair), Gillmon, Kyle and Vickery.

In attendance: The clerk, Cllr Janet Richards (NFDC) and 9 members of the public.

24.46 TO ELECT A CHAIR FOR 2024/25 Cllr Kyle proposed, Cllr Donnell seconded and it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to elect Cllr Gemmell as Chair for 2024/25. Cllr Gemmell signed a declaration to formally accept the role of Chair.

24.47 TO ELECT A VICE-CHAIR FOR 2024/25 Cllr Gillmon proposed, Cllr Vickery seconded and it was unanimously **RESOLVED** to elect Cllr Lavis as Vice-Chair for 2024/25.

23.48 TO RECEIVE ANY APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE: - Cllr Lavis

23.49 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST - To receive declarations of interest in respect of matters contained in this agenda (in accordance with the Localism Act 2011).

Cllr Donnell and Gillmon declared an interest in item 24.52 24/00236FULL. Cllr Donnell will not partake in the discussion or decision on this item but will stay in the room. It was agreed that Cllr Gillmon was not required to recuse herself from the item.

24.50 MINUTES

24.50.1 It was unanimously **RESOLVED** to approve the minutes of the meeting held on 5th March 2024.

24.50.2 Note matters arising from the minutes not elsewhere on the agenda.

Alderholt Planning Application APP/D1265/W/23/33336518 – Aderholt Parish Council has been granted Rule 6 Status and will be playing a full part in the Planning Inquiry (begins 25th June) in support of Dorset Councils refusal of planning permission for a large development. Cllr Lavis will attend the appeal and represent Hale Parish Council to add its own views on this development.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) – Hale PC has received £600 from NFDC to fund the street furniture required for the speed indicator devices. Parish councils were able to bid for funds from the CIL that NFDC has accumulated from development.

24.51 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION - Members of the public are invited to address the council on agenda matters or raise any matters not otherwise on the agenda.

Parishioners present spoke of their concern regarding the amended planning application for Harry's Meadow campsite which has been submitted. Parishioners are concerned with some aspects of the processing of the application by the New Forest Planning Authority.

23.52 PLANNING APPLICATION - To consider the response to the following applications.

Application number: 24/00102FULL (Amendment)

Proposal: Use of land as a seasonal campsite for 50 pitches for no more than

60 days in a calendar year

Location: Harry's Meadow, Hale Park, Hale, SP6 2RE

Hale Parish Council recommended refusal to the original application (to which some amendments have been made). A document has been produced and submitted by Holbury Consultancy Service in response to the parish council's recommendation; this was discussed alongside the amendments to the application. HPC agreed that many aspects of the application have still not been addressed

including the effect on the lime tree avenue which is in a poor state, a sufficient ecological assessment being carried out and the access to the site (single track road (Hale Lane) which is in a very dangerous state). It was unanimously agreed and **RESOLVED** to recommend refusal and a second response from HPC will be submitted.

Application number: 24/00370VAR

Proposal: Application to vary condition 2 of planning permission 23/01103FULL for roof alterations to include hip-to-gable conversion of the main roof (both ends)

and the forward projecting roof; see application.

Location: Freefolk, Hale Purlieu, SP6 2NN

Hale Parish Council recommended permission for this application which was granted in November 2023. Proposed alterations have now been submitted, HPC agreed that the alterations enhance the design and have no concerns with the application. It was unanimously agreed and **RESOLVED** to recommend Option 3 – Permission.

Application number: 24/00236FULL

Proposal: Replacement dwelling; garage; outbuilding (gym & bat house);

wildlife pond; landscaping; (demolition of existing two storey dwelling and outbuildings)

Location: Woodriding, Hale Purlieu, SP6 2QZ

Hale Parish Council discussed the application and felt the Design and Access statement, Ecology Report and other documents submitted to be very comprehensive and detailed. Councillors agreed that a replacement building is a large consideration but the good design, build and sustainability features of the proposed building mitigate this. Much advice and surveying has taken place regarding the nature conservation of the site and mitigation measures are part of the design, including a wildlife pond, bat house and meadow. Although this site is adjacent to an SSSI there will be significant screening in the form of new planting. Councillors suggested plating a specific "New Forest mix" which includes a range of appropriate species. It was unanimously agreed and RESOLVED to recommend Option 3 – Permission.

24.53 LOCAL ROADS .

Recent remedial works have taken place in the parish including surface dressing of Hale Purlieu and Tethering Drove and the current replacement of the cattle grid in Hale Road which has led to the closure of the road. Hale PC discussed frustration that despite much effort little communication is received from HCC regarding works to be carried out.

Hale Lane - Hale PC is still regularly informing HCC of the current condition of Hale Lane.

Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) – The posts which hold the SIDs have recently been moved by HCC Highways as they were originally installed in places contrary to those agreed. HPC plans to install sleeves to hold removable posts along Tethering Drove and Hale Purlieu but are awaiting confirmation from the National Trust surveyor.

24.54 ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY (APA) 2024 The APA was held on April 30th with a new format and was attended by approx 25 parishioners. HPC will continue to look at new ways to engage parishioners and widen the attendance at the APA.

24.55 EXTERNAL MEETINGS - To receive reports from external meetings attended.

Hale Village Hall Management Meeting 9^{th} May – Cllr Kyle attended. Grants have been received to fund works to insulate the ceiling and these works will be carried out in July.

New Forest Wetlands talk – Cllr Vickery attended a talk on freshwater wetland habitats within the New Forest; an information video was shown at the APA.

NFDC Community Forum - A forum was held on 27th March on Community Resilience; Cllr Donnell and the clerk attended. Cllr Donnell has lead the first Hale PC working group on this topic and has presented the idea to Woodgreen Parish Council with the aim of sharing ideas and resources. A draft of an Emergency and Resilience plan will be put forward in the next few months.

Magazine article for June 2024

In Westminster Abbey in Poet's Corner is a memorial to Philip Larkin. Inscribed on the memorial are the words:

"Our almost-instinct almost true:

What will survive of us is love"

They are the last two lines of one of his most famous poems, 'An Arundel Tomb.' The poem was written after visiting Chichester cathedral and seeing the medieval stone effigies of the Earl of Arundel and his second wife Eleanor of Lancaster. The recumbent figures lie side by side with the earl dressed in full armour and Eleanor in long gown, wimple, and veil. The Earl's right hand however is ungloved and, resting lightly upon his hand, is the right hand of Eleanor. It is a poignant scene of sentiment memorialized in stone and it inspired Larkin to reflect on the nature of love. Instinctively we want something of our lives to continue after death but is our instinct true?

On May 8th each year the church celebrates the live of the 14th century mystic, Julian of Norwich. She lived at the same time as the Earl of Arundel and Eleanor of Lancaster. At the age of 30 she was suffering from what was believed to be a terminal illness. She then experienced a series of visions which persuaded her of the love of God. She recovered and spent the next twenty years writing the first ever book to be written by a woman in the English language. It was called 'Revelations of Divine Love.'

It was Julian who wrote the famous words:

"All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well." She expresses her sense of cosmic optimism fully aware of earthly trials and writes elsewhere:

"If there is anywhere on earth a lover of God who is always kept safe, I know nothing of it, for it was not shown to me. But this was shown: that in falling and rising again we are always kept in the same precious love."

Julian's faith, hope and love rested in the love of God who she believed held her in being and would continue to do so even through death. Two centuries later the poet John Donne expressed the same faith with the words:

"Whom God loves he loves to the end. And not only to their own end; to their death but to his end; and his end is, that he might love them still."

Larkin writes of his own poem, "Love isn't stronger than death just because statues hold hands for six hundred years." Surely, he is right but this Ascensiontide is a time to remember that the last word lies with the living Christ whose dying and rising demonstrates that love is stronger than death and that the empty tomb speaks yet more powerfully than even an Arundel tomb of a love that is eternal.
